My Wilkerson College Experience

I was first asked about attending Wilkerson College last year, while I was sitting as the Junior Deacon. I was relatively new to the lodge, and the preceding year had been a whirlwind of activity. My head was still spinning from the events of the past year including having been initiated, passed, raised, and appointed to a chair. I was quite taken with Masonry, but I was simply not ready for Wilkerson College, and frankly I needed a break.

This Spring I was in my new position as Senior Deacon, and things had settled down a bit by the time I was again approached about attending. Several of my Masonic mentors knew the value of the experience and encouraged me to apply. Soon I found myself standing in the lobby of the Cobb Center on the campus of MHCO, along with 40 other members of the future class of 2009. We all muddled around, making awkward introductions, and wondering what we had gotten ourselves into. What followed were three weekends of the most useful, task-oriented training that I have been involved with in a very, very long time. Since I am writing this article for "The Traveler" newsletter, I thought my focus should be more on my general observations than on specifics, since most of the Lodge's members are already familiar with the curriculum.

The first session was at MHCO and the last was at WhiteStone, it didn't take long to realize that one of the themes of the college was to teach us what the charities were really about. While the charities are important to all masons, they became much more personal to me after having spent some time at them. Meeting the staff, and the residents of each charity makes it easy to want to support efforts on their behalf. To the 40 future leaders of our fraternity that Wilkerson College produced in the class of 2009, we learned that our charities are not some abstract mission located somewhere in central North Carolina, they are real places with people that still tug at our heart strings.


The next lesson that I learned was that if there was one idea that the staff wanted us to remember, it was to plan, plan, plan. It was incorporated into every lecture of the entire course. The staff even spiked the Kool-Aid with the recurring theme of planning for our year in the East. I don't know what awaits me during my time in the East, but I know that I will enter that year with a well-structured plan.

It was somewhere in the middle of one of the planning lectures that it dawned on me that, barring something unforeseen, I was probably going to be the Master of my Lodge in a few years. I knew when I accepted a Stewards chair that was the way the line of officers usually worked, but I had not *really* thought it through. Listening to the lectures, I knew that I was wholly unprepared to make that step. But that was of course why I was attending Wilkerson College. I was comforted by the fact that I was being instructed on how to prepare myself. That led to the next logical thought, which really shook me. Knowing how dramatically unprepared I would be ascending to the East without the benefit of this college, I thought of how many men has done just that in the last 200 plus years. When I look at the pictures on the wall of the past Masters at my Lodge, as good of leaders as they were & are, I can't help but to wonder how Wilkerson College could have helped them become more prepared?


